Executive Summary


Midsomer Norton is undergoing an ambitious transformation through the IMAGINE Midsomer Norton programme, a regeneration initiative led by Bath & North East Somerset Council in partnership with Midsomer Norton Town Council, with funding support from the West of England Mayoral Combined Authority's Housing and Regeneration Enabling Fund.

Midsomer Norton is a medieval market town in North East Somerset, approximately 10 miles south west of Bath and 15 miles south of Bristol. The town is positioned as a local hub serving surrounding towns and villages within B&NES district and beyond.

Since 2019, Midsomer Norton, like many UK high streets has faced a decline in footfall. The growth of online shopping, accelerated by the COVID-19 pandemic, has shifted consumer habits away from in-person retail. Rising inflation and cost-of-living crises have also reduced non-essential spending, further discouraging visits to high streets. The town needs to continue to evolve to remain vibrant.

The next phase of Midsomer Norton's regeneration is now being planned in two parts. The Regeneration Action

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Plan covers improvements to the whole town centre, stretching the length of the High Street, surrounding residential areas and the Town Park. The Old Brewery Quarter Town Centre Masterplan focuses on an area centred around the Old Brewery buildings at the lower end of the town centre and considers development opportunities.

There will be ongoing engagement on both parts of the plan as they progress through different stages until final adoption. The programme's name, IMAGINE Midsomer Norton, encourages residents, visitors and businesses to look towards the future of the town centre and share bold and creative ideas.

Early-stage public engagement ('Discover' stage) took place between September and November 2024. The engagement activities undertaken and the responses to the engagement are summarised in this report. Emerging themes from the public engagement will help to identify areas of focus and priority projects, directly informing the next stage of the masterplanning process.

1 Engagement Approach

The aim of the 'Discover' stage engagement was to ensure that local people knew about forthcoming plans, and to give them wide-ranging and accessible opportunities for feedback.

Early, open, transparent, responsive and inclusive engagement has significant potential to improve planning outcomes by ensuring they are shaped by community needs.

The engagement strategy considered how best to engage anyone who uses Midsomer Norton town centre facilities alongside anyone who may wish to use the town centre in future. Residents, workers, business owners, landlords, and visitors all have a part to play in shaping a vision for the town centre.

To avoid barriers to participation, a local artist and educator, Kevin Campbell Davidson, was appointed to facilitate two of the in-person sessions at family friendly venues, supplementing other engagement streams. These sessions aimed to open up people's imaginations, foster intergenerational conversations and make complex ideas more accessible. They also elicited responses from a broad cross-section of the community, ensuring that planning decisions are informed by diverse public perspectives.

2 'Discover' Engagement Activity Summary

'Discover' phase community engagement commenced in September 2024 with a series of informal conversations with internal and external stakeholders, businesses, and members of the public.


Details on the project were published on the <u>B&NES Regen website</u> which included a project background page, event listings and FAQs.



3 'Discover' Engagement Sessions

A combination of briefings, 1-1 discussions and drop-in public engagement events were held as part of the early-stage engagement.

Briefings were held for Ward and Town Councillors, Officers, landowners, community groups and other stakeholders. The meetings were held in person or virtually (see A13 for example of the presentation material). Where more focused discussion was required, 1-1 follow-up meetings were scheduled. Many of these conversations will continue into the next phase of engagement.

The project team held a total of 6 drop-in engagement events across the early-stage engagement period - 2 online, and 4 in-person. These were organised for a range of

times, including morning, afternoon and evening, across the week, to maximise opportunities for people to engage. The sessions were open to all stakeholders and members of the public and included pop-ups at long-running town events, including the Somerset Farmers Market and Christmas light switch-on.

Creative sessions led by Kevin Campbell Davidson incorporated lively activities including a 'silent disco' tour of the high street, building a 'scrap map' of the high street from recycled materials, and 'game show' style participatory games. These activities were designed to inspire participants to think creatively about the engagement questions being asked. After participating, people were encouraged to add their ideas to the formal engagement boards. See A14 for the artist's event report.

4.1 'Discover' Engagement Responses Summary

One thing that I imagine for the future of Midsomer Norton town centre is...

Engagement activities were structured around two open-ended prompts.

The prompts were designed to elicit a wide range of perspectives covering all areas of town regeneration, including physical, cultural, social, economic, environmental, and policy.

Participants were asked to pin their ideas on a town centre map. For this stage, a fixed boundary line for the overall Town Centre Plan was not provided. Local people's responses will be used to refine the geographical scope of the project.

Responses would demonstrate what already worked well in Midsomer Norton, alongside highlighting focus areas for improvement. From the collated responses, the project team would identify several core themes to help shape the next phases of the planning process.

Over 300 comments were received in total:

- 104 received through the online interactive map
- 207 added to engagement boards during drop-in events
- 10 during virtual drops ins
- 9 during business visits.

4.2 Findings: One thing that I love...

When asked what they loved about the town centre as it is today, respondents focused on:

Community Life

People love the strong sense of community spirit in the town - markets, community events, friendly people, ethos of volunteering, and the celebration of local stories and heritage. There is real local pride for Midsomer Norton.



Green and Blue Spaces


The river, the Town Park, the Hollies Gardens and the Greenway are all wonderful assets to the town centre. People love that recent projects have improved these spaces - including the addition of paths to the park, and the naturalisation of the river.



Independent Shopping


Midsomer Norton's markets, independent shops and cafes are important to people, not only providing practical places to buy daily essentials but also offering spaces to come together and socialise.





4.3 Findings: One thing that I imagine...

When asked what they imagine for the future of Midsomer Norton, most respondents focused on:



A Pedestrian-Friendly Town Centre

Many respondents envision a Midsomer Norton where pedestrian experience takes centre stage - especially considering those with mobility issues. There are areas of the high street that are difficult to navigate on foot, for example where there is a lack of pavement or crossings. Wayfinding between the high street, the town's main car parks and local green spaces could be improved. Many people aspire to partial or full pedestrianisation of the lower high street as a way of providing more space for street greening and community events.



Thriving Community Spaces

Some would like to see support for existing community spaces, such as the library, Town Hall, Somer Centre and amphitheatre. Others suggest that new spaces would add to the town's cultural richness - including art studios, a theatre, a share and repair cafe, a community kitchen, a climate hub, a community café, a heritage centre and a bandstand. Much-loved local events like the carnival need to be supported, and the town calendar could be enhanced with more events throughout the year. There's a particular need for activities and meeting spaces for families and young people.

4.3 Findings: One thing that I imagine...

Revitalised Riverfront


The river is a core part of Midsomer Norton's character, and many people want to see it flourish. They envision the daylighting of additional stretches, improved pedestrian access, more viewpoints, more trees and lighting.

Areas where the river could be better cleaned and maintained are also identified.



Heritage-Led Redevelopment

There are several privately owned sites which hold immense redevelopment potential - including the High Street Old Brewery, Holly Court, the former Welton Bibby & Baron site, the Stones Cross Pub, Chesterfield House and the former Midsomer Norton Gas Works. There is support for mixed-use development to include retail, housing, food and co-working spaces. Commenters emphasise that any development should respect the town's unique historic character.



Retail and Recreation for Everyone

The high street's existing independent shops are to be celebrated, but there are gaps in the retail offer - commenters would like greater diversity of retail, more food outlets, and a more vibrant evening economy.

Non-retail amenities are also considered important to the mix - such as fitness centres, gaming cafes, cinema and bowling.



as well as...

Improvements to the public realm: lighting, waste management, more seating, bollards and greening.

Business support: shopfront improvement grants, a shopping map, trader engagement, subsidised market space, and marketing/social training.

Car parking: more disabled parking, support for traders, and management/refurbishment of existing facilities.



5 Next steps

Having completed the 'Discover' stage engagement for IMAGINE Midsomer Norton, the project team will work together with specialist consultants to create a place vision for Midsomer Norton town centre.

There will be ongoing engagement throughout the masterplanning process, including a formal public consultation in Summer 2025.

We understand that sometimes the wait between public engagement and delivery can be long. The development of projects is complex and takes time, but we are committed to delivering a plan that has a positive impact on Midsomer Norton town centre.

In the meantime, we are working with local groups and businesses to bring forward community ideas from previous projects, including:

- An events programme for the Market Square at The Island
- Wayfinding murals
- Creative window installations






We're starting a new conversation about the future of your Midsomer Norton. We are aware that there are some opportunities to improve the town centre and we want to explore how we can ensure Midsomer Norton town centre continues to be a vibrant place.

We are creating an updated plan for Midsomer Norton town centre in two parts. The Old Brewery Quarter Town Centre Masterplan focuses on an area centred around the Old Brewery buildings at the lower end of the town centre, considering development opportunities. The Regeneration Action Plan covers improvements to the whole town centre area, stretching the full length of the High Street, surrounding residential areas and the Town Park.

Together, they will provide a route map to a more vibrant and welcoming town centre for residents, businesses and visitors.

We want to find out what local people love about Midsomer Norton town centre, and what change is needed. IMAGINE Midsomer Norton is all about giving you the chance to have your say and help build a vision for a newly imagined Midsomer Norton.



Project background

Read the story behind the project.

Midsomer Norton is a medieval market town which became an important coal-mining community in the nineteenth century. The town is compact, arranged around a linear High Street with larger developments and back accesses to the rear.

Since 2019, Midsomer Norton, like many UK High Streets has faced a decline in footfall, driven by multiple factors. The growth of online shopping, accelerated by the COVID-19 pandemic, has shifted consumer habits away from in-person retail. Rising inflation and cost-of-living crises have also reduced non-essential spending, further discouraging visits to high streets. The town centre needs to continue to evolve and improve to remain a vibrant place.

While Midsomer Norton is designated as a conservation area its heritage value is currently still 'at risk'. The poor visual quality of modern developments, such as retail units and car parks, has over time detracted from the areas historic character. Maintaining public spaces and buildings continue to require investment.

IMAGINE Midsomer Norton seeks to build on the important work of the <u>High Street Heritage Action Zone</u> programme and set a bold vision for Midsomer Norton's future High Street which:

- · Integrates modern infrastructure with heritage conservation to enhance the town's appeal and functionality while supporting local businesses
- · Builds a blueprint for future investment that aligns with the towns aspirations and capitalises on its unique culture and heritage
- Provides a route map to a more vibrant and welcoming town centre for residents, businesses and visitors.

How is this project funded?

This project is funded by the Housing and Regeneration Enabling Fund (managed by the West of England Combined Authority).

Why are there two plans?

The two plans tackle different geographical areas and will be implemented over different timescales. The Old Brewery Quarter Town Centre Masterplan is a long-term strategic vision focusing on an area centred around the Old Brewery buildings at the lower end of the town centre. The Regeneration Action Plan forms a basis for funding bids for short- to medium-term interventions covering the whole town centre area, stretching the full length of the High Street, surrounding residential areas and the Town Park.

What sort of changes will I see in Midsomer Norton as a result of this project?

At the moment – we don't know! During the first stages of the project, we'll be working closely with residents, businesses, community stakeholders and charities to develop a shared vision for the town centre.

Is this project linked to the Town Hall restoration and Market Square redevelopment?

Yes. Each project is part of a wider regeneration programme for Midsomer Norton which began with the town's designation as a High Street Heritage Action Zone (HSHAZ) in 2020. That scheme came to an end in March 2024 but has been used as a catalyst for further successful funding bids, allowing several projects to extend beyond the end of the HSHAZ. This has brought in £3.7million investment in the town centre already. IMAGINE Midsomer Norton is the next phase in this wider regeneration programme, and will seek to support ongoing investment.

What is a regeneration action plan?

A regeneration action plan is a document which lays out priority actions for improving the vitality of a place. It identifies existing projects and considers them alongside possible future initiatives, using this as the basis for funding bids. It can incorporate a range of different actions, including but not limited to improvement of public spaces through both public and private investment in the high street and business premises; addressing vacant units; business development and support; strengthening communities through events and cultural programming.

What is a masterplan?

A masterplan is a long-term planning document for an area, describing how the area could be developed. It looks at how things are laid out now and how things could look in future, bringing them together into an overarching vision. For Midsomer Norton, this could include elements like public realm improvements, community spaces, site planning for key sites, green spaces, housing, and transport infrastructure – considering how they all work together to provide a vibrant place to live, work and play.

The High Street Regeneration Programme will continue to enhance the appeal of Midsomer Norton and support local trade through the creation of a plan in two parts: a Regeneration Action Plan and a Masterplan.

IMAGINE Midsomer Norton is a series of events and discussions over the autumn at which people can get involved in the plans and have their say on future project ideas to improve Midsomer Norton town centre.

The Regeneration Action Plan covers the whole town centre including the High Street, surrounding residential areas and the town park. The Masterplan focuses on an area around the former Midsomer Norton Brewery buildings at the lower end of the High Street.



These plans are an extension of the <u>High Street Regeneration Programme</u> that is currently under way. They will help set a future vision for Midsomer Norton town centre which can:

- Integrate modern infrastructure with heritage conservation to enhance the town and support local businesses
- Build a blueprint for future investment that aligns with the town's aspirations and capitalises on its unique culture and heritage
- Provide a route map to a more vibrant and welcoming town centre for residents, businesses and visitors.

Councillor Paul Roper, cabinet member for Economic and Cultural Sustainable Development, said: "Midsomer Norton town centre has benefitted from £3.7m investment over the last five years to transform the town hall, improve public spaces, shopfront improvements and bring cultural and community projects for the town.

"This new masterplan and regeneration action plan for Midsomer Norton will build on the improvements already being made to identify priorities for future investment.

"Our aim is to continue to attract people into the town centre, making it a place that residents and visitors want to spend time in and supporting local businesses. Midsomer Norton is the second town in Bath and North East Somerset to benefit from town centre regeneration action plans funded by £750,000 from the West of England Combined Authority's Housing and Regeneration Enabling Fund. A plan for Radstock has been completed and has already brought in significant funding and Action Plans for Twerton and Keynsham are also planned.

- 1. Introductory activity: Midsomer Norton quiz (see Appendix A) [10 mins]

- a) Observing / listening activity watching 'High Street Heroes' video about local activists who made positive changes.
- b) Option for teacher to pause video after each hero to check comprehension ask questions, and connect with local landmarks.

- b) Using the ideas generated by the previous activity, each pupil is given paper and drawing materials to create a 'dream town' vision for Midsomer
- c) Option to give each pupil a print out of the map plan of MSN to support
- d) Option for pupils to share designs afterwards.

6. Lesson Ending [5 mins]

- a) Teacher highlights community events which children can engage with in
- b) The first of these free events takes place on Saturday 2nd November and uses silent disco headphones as part of a creative imagining activity.



A14 Artist's report

Artistic approaches can open up people's imaginations to ideas that might seem inconceivable / impractical, we can learn about what they really want and work backwards towards something more practical - e.g. one young person suggested a cat cafe - literally a cafe which has many cats in it. Whilst this may not be practical (I'm not sure - safeguarding etc) there may be scope for making the town centre more pet-friendly and this can carry wellbeing benefits. It might be interesting to explore the barriers that people face with bringing their pets into the town centre.

Leveraging artists' networks to draw people into the consultation who may not have attended. e.g. My facebook post was shared by a friend who knows my work and lives in London to her friend who lives in MSN who I don't know - "you should check this out, Kevin is great etc". This woman came along, participated in the engagement and then had lots to say about what she felt the town needed. Even if the specific engagement had no impact on her views, it got her along to the event and 'warmed her up' so that she shared her views when she might otherwise not have done. To give another example of this, an old gymnastics coach of mine turned up with her child and partner, and she invited another friend who arrived later - they would have been unlikely to come without the fact that they wanted to come say hi to me

Intergenerational conversations - I saw parents asking their children about what they'd like to see in the town centre - this may not be conversation they have ever had with their child and may help parents to understand how to improve their child's engagement with this town centre.

Visually impactful - by having lots of colourful chalk drawings over the floor, a strong visual presence was achieved which had the effect of drawing other families into the space - this may include 'passers by' who we would not be able to access by internet communication, therefore diversifying voices.

Broader representation - listening to ideas from children who might not be able to contribute in other ways which are not movement/play-oriented, making potentially complex ideas accessible to younger minds.

Developing positive relationship between council, market traders and public - we elicited many smiles from the market traders as we passed by, introducing

a little train of dancing people into the space, and then moving through so we didn't get in anyone's way. The candle stall next to us said "I'd love to have you here every week".

Reciprocity - we gave our audience a free experience which was enjoyable for them, either directly or through the experience of their children's enjoyment. After this, their sharing of feedback had a reciprocal feeling.

Ownership - by moving through the regeneration spaces whilst developing ideas, participants might gain a greater sense of ownership over the outcomes.

Longer term engagement - such was the positive feedback from the artistic experience, many participants would likely come back if invited into a similar experience to develop the engagement.
